Quality audit

1st training for quality auditors by Mrs Ikatonga Hingano

October 2020 was a busy month. Two training workshops were conducted on same day (9th of October), one on quality audit which was held at TNQAB and is covered immediately below, and the other on qualification review held at *Longolongo* LDS Hall and is covered on pages 4 and 5 of this Issue.

Two trainings were conducted on quality audit this quarter.

On the 9th October 2020, eight industry professionals were invited to TNQAB to participate in the first quality audit training. These individuals were selected to assist with three quality audits which have been scheduled for 2020, for *Montfort Technical Institute* (MTI), 'Ahopanilolo Technical Institute (ATI) and Christ University in Pacific (CUP).



The audit panel members who participated in the audit panel training on the 8th of October, 2020 and Mrs. Ikatonga Hingano and the TNQAB Deputy CEO, Mrs. Pauline Moa, who both administered the training.

The objective of the first audit training was for the participants to understand their roles as audit panelists. The participants were given the opportunity to understand the conditions of their contract, as well as a *conflict of interest* declaration form and the *code of ethics*. The participants also carried out mock interviews to learn how to conduct such activity in an audit.

The workshop sessions were informative and engaging and were delivered by Mrs Ikatonga Hingano and Mrs Pauline Moa. The organization wishes to thank these participants for consenting to become quality audit panelists and for committing to this training. END

On the 30th of November, 2020, a bigger group of nineteen (19) representatives from local PCET providers, were invited for the second quality training workshop which was held at the *House of Tonga*. The objective of this training was to increase provider awareness of the quality audit process.

Quality audit process: what and why?

In brief, a training provider (PCET) is only granted accreditation to deliver education in Tonga when it has met three (3) quality standards commonly referred to as Accreditation Standards 1. 2. and 3.

Accreditation is granted only for a renewable term of 2 years (maximum). Once a provider is granted accreditation to deliver a specific training programme, TNQAB also schedules this provider into its quality audit timetable and informs the provider.

A quality audit is conducted only to providers that have already been granted a TNQAB accreditation status to ensure they are consistently complying with the criteria of Accreditation Standards 1, 2, and 3.

Depending on the need or scope of audit to be conducted by TNQAB, there are three (3) main types:

- Full audit this involves an evaluation against all the criteria of the three quality standards.
- Focused audit involves an evaluation against specific elements of the three quality standards.
- Special audit— when major concerns about a provider have been identified.

In the second part of the workshop, Mrs Pauline Moa elaborated on the onsite audit visit and informed participants of what is expected of PCET providers during a site visit as well as the documents required to be submitted for the quality audit.

The workshop was an opportunity for participants not only to gain a better understanding of the audit process but to also share their experiences from their own workplaces and to voice common concerns.

The workshop was well-received and enjoyed by the participants.

Qualification review

Training for qualification reviewers by Mr. Kisione Manu

On the 9th of October 2020, at the Longolongo LDS Hall, Mr Kisione Manu, the team leader of the Qualifications Framework Division, conducted a workshop for qualification reviewers. This is one of two training workshops conduted by TNQAB on this same day. The other on quality audit is being covered on pages 2 and 3.

This is the first training workshop to be conducted on this important process.

Targeting training providers whose courses are due for audit and review, this workshop attracted 34 participants most of whom are in charge of quality assurance in their respective institutions. The presentation was based on the review of registered qualifications to inform providers of the processes involved.

Mr. Manu emphasized to participants the need for them to confirm during a review if they had made changes to the accredited programme and if so, to decide if the changes are significant enough to warrant a resubmission of the programme for accreditation.

The participants were grateful for this workshop. However, many expressed their need for frequent and regular training on the qualification review, and if possible, to be conducted in their individual schools to give them more time and opportunity to engage with the TNQAB staff overseeing the qualification review process.

Qualification review by Kisone Manu

As stipulated in the TNQAB Act 2004 Part IV Section 17:

- "(1) All registered providers shall be required to undertake reviews of their courses and units of study.
- (2) The review under subsection (1) shall include investigation of the following:
 - (a) ability of the provider to continue their approved educational provision;
 - (b) the standard of education content of the approved course of study;
 - (c) the appropriateness of the qualification; and
 - (d) resources provided for the delivery of the course of study.
- (3)A review carried out under this section shall be conducted every 2 years."

A qualification review: a 'fit for purpose' assessment by Vilimaka Foliaki

The review of a qualification is an opportunity for developers of qualifications and providers of education and training to take stock of their services especially their training programmes to see whether they are still fit for purpose.

It is an opportunity for developers of qualifications to assess how:

- well their qualifications are responding to the purposes they were initially developed for;
- much those initial 'needs' the qualifications were developed in the first place to address, may have changed and how these changes could be factored into the existing design and structure of the qualification.

Our registered qualifications, through our training programmes, are one of the main means through which our students gain the skills, knowledge, and expertise to respond to the challenges they face in contemporary society.

Reviewing our qualifications is not an exercise to be conducted by an individual staff or provider, in isolation and independent of the current needs of stakeholders.

TQF Registration

Validation of national qualifications by Villmaka Foliaki

Validation of qualifications is one of the quality assurance processes required of all national qualifications which are developed for registration on the Tonga Qualifications Framework (TQF). On Tuesday the 27th to Friday the 20th October 2020, a five member registration panel met at TNQAB to validate and endorse two new national qualifications in sustainable energy:

- 1. National Certificate in Sustainable Energy Level 1
- 2. National Certificate in Sustainable Energy Level 2

The panel consisted of Mr. Timote Tu'ipulotu (Project manager, Tonga Power Limited), Mr. Painitu'uua Lie (Graduate engineer, Tonga Power Limited), Mr. Fe'ao Teutau (General manager, Kingdom Energy), Mr. Kaufana Valita (Deputy Technical Officer, Electricity Commission), and Mrs. Lesieli Tupola (Quality Assurance Officer, TNQAB).

This meeting consisted of a one day training of the panelists on the required processes and a 3-day validation of the two national qualifications. The training as well as the validation of the qualifications were facilitated by Mr. Vilimaka Foliaki, PQO-National qualifications.

This registration panel meeting is of particular significance as it is the first time a panel is utilized to validate a qualification before it is approved for TQF-registration.

The validation process

In a nutshell, validation is a process carried out to assess the validity of a process or product. It is carried out in many of work contexts.

In quality assurance of education, apart from the type of validation that is being covered here, there is also assessment validation.

The validation discussed in these two pages refer to the validation of a newly developed national qualification. It is a process carried out to ensure that the characteristics of the proposed national qualification, including each unit of competency, meet the needs of stakeholders and are technically correct.

It involves a critical evaluation of all aspects of the qualification, from clarity and appropriateness of language used by the developer to issues related to compliance with TNQAB quality standards.

This type of validation is an important process because it not only ensures that the qualification is error-free but it also demonstrates to TNQAB that the qualification developer has consulted widely with stakeholders and has listened to their feedback

Every national qualification that is developed for TQF-registration must be subjected to this process.

Validation of national qualifications by Vilimaka Foliaki (Continue...)

The meeting was opened by Dr. 'Opeti Pulotu, CEO for TNQAB, who emphasized the critical role of this important partnership between the industry and TNQAB in the assurance of quality education and training for post compulsory education and training in Tonga.

The Board of Directors of TNQAB, on the 30th of November, 2020, approved the TQF-registration of the following national qualifications:

- 1. National Certificate in Sustainable Energy Level 1
- 2. National Certificate in Sustainable Energy Level 2

These are the two new national qualifications which were validated a month earlier, and covered on the previous page.

These qualifications were developed and submitted for TQF registration by the Pacific Centre for Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency (PCREEE) and the Department of Energy of the Tonga Ministry of Meteorology, Energy, Information, Disaster Management, Environment, Climate Change and Communications (MEIDECC). This qualification development initiative was made possible through financial support from the EU-PacTVET Project.

What next? by Vilimaka Foliaki

Major policy development

Review of the current *TNQAB Act 2016*, a momentous event by 'Amelia Tohu'ia Manuofetoa

The focus of the Policy unit is the TNQAB Act, Regulations, policies, and procedures and how they assist stakeholders to reach the threshold of quality education. In addition, the main responsibilities of the unit are vested in the Act and important documents of the organization; tasks like developing new policies and reviewing existing ones, monitoring internal compliance with organizational policies and conducting training on the TNQAB policies.

A major task that involved the TNQAB Policy unit in the second half of 2020 was the review of the TNQAB Act 2016. The Government of Australia, through *Tonga Skills*, funded this important project which is currently in phase 2 and is expected to be completed in April 2021.

The Policy unit assisted this project by compiling and sending all TNQAB approved policies and guidelines to the legal adviser, Ms Sela Bloomfied, who is contracted to conduct the review process. It is anticipated that when this is complete, the potential benefits include the following:

- 1. Improved clarity of the organization's processes in its policies, guidelines, and other important documents
- 2. Better relationships with stakeholders
- More opportunities available to benefit both TNQAB and its stakeholders
- 4. Improved consistency in our working documents
- 5. More sustainable and inclusive development in necessary areas
- 6. Effect positive changes in Tongan society
- 7. Promote the organization's vision, mission and goals.

Let's hope for great return from this collective task. This future success may greatly attribute to your work behind the scene, patience and support. May I encourage each one of us to keep steering ahead with a purpose to complete this important project. I must leave you with a simple question: "What you may give up, in order for us to go up?"

Finally, on behalf of the CEO and the organization, I would like to acknowledge the Australian Government through Tonga Skills for funding this initiative as well as the legal adviser, Mrs. Sela Bloomfield, for carry out an exceedingly tough task. Let's not stop praying for cooperation until this Act Review Project is complete.
